1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sri Lakshmi Narasimha Swamy College, Bhongir has different phases of growth and development since its inception in 1973 and moving towards to celebrate GOLDEN JUBILEE.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The Telangana agitation that rocked the entire state of Andhra Pradesh during the early 1970's underscored the pressing need for the spread of education, as a means of economic empowerment, in the backward region of Telangana.

This situation stimulated by Late K.Jagmohan, a Veteran Teacher and lawyer, an idea of starting a degree college in Bhongir Town. In an effort to fulfil his dream, he carried the idea to Sri Shankarji of Osmania Graduates' Association(OGA) which strove relentlessly for the cause of education and economic empowerment in Telangana region.

Late Pothnak Pentaji and Karepe Bhavanaji, the local Philanthropists, came forward to donate 10 acres of land and to sell 10 more acres on nominal price. As a result, , SRI LAKSHMI NARASIMHA SWAMY COLLEGE had come out on 10.10.1973. Late Dr. Ravinarayan Reddy, M.P., a political stalwart, gave a new lease of life to the college by getting grant-in-aid.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The Institution has an effective mechanism for well-planned curriculum.

- 1. **College/ Institution level:** To execute the curriculum completion in time, the college prepares an Academic calendar very meticulously, before the academic year commences. Accordingly, an effective time table is prepared. The college declares the dates of the University and College Examinations well in advance so that students get ample time to prepare for examinations and the teachers complete the curriculum in time. The list of holidays as per University and State circulars is put on the notice boards for the planning of the academic sessions.
- 2. **Department Level:** All the departments take departmental meetings on the regular basis with Principal to supervise the teaching-learning process. Different innovative teaching methodologies are to be organised and implemented to complete the curriculum effectively are discussed in the departmental meetings. The departmental timetable is prepared and the care is taken to see to it that it is getting executed properly. The workload is distributed to the staff-members. The care is taken to complete the curriculum in a stipulated time. The head of the department takes review of the departmental activities from time to time.
- 3. **Individual level:** The implementation of curriculum is smoothly administered by teachers. Every teacher follows individual timetable. Class-wise, course-wise and number of lecture wise teaching plan is prepared by the individual teacher. Teachers complete the curriculum within the stipulated time. Every teacher enjoys the freedom to follow any innovative idea of teaching they wish. If need be teachers also take extra lectures to complete the syllabus.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Our college admissions are allocated by online mechanism adopted by Govt. of Telangana, Degree Online Services Telangana – DOST, based on merit, rule of reservations etc.

Many of our students are under privileged belongs to BS, SC, STs and Minorities with diversified backgrounds.

IQAC regularly initiates many positive steps for improving the quality parameters to cater the needs of the staff and students.

All the courses of UG and PG are with CBCS pattern. Internal evaluation, discipline specific courses (DSC), Skill enhancement courses (SEC), Practical examinations, Field trips, Workshops / seminars, project works are the integral parts of our education cum evaluation system.

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Teaching and learning is done by using charts, models, presentations etc. Teachers are utilizing e-resources, power point presentations, google classroom, WhatsApp groups etc. for online classes during this pandemic situation.

Some of the teachers have developed Youtube lectures, concerned links were posted in the whatsapp groups.

Academic calendar is prepared every year after the commencement of academic year.

All faculty are cooperative, committed and experienced. They are encouraged to go for refresher courses, FDPs, attending seminars etc.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Our college has well equipped central instrumentation lab to promote the experimental, laboratory and research skills. All the staff are encouraged to register for PhDs and some teachers are pursuing research. Some faculties were qualified for State Eligibility Test (SET) and National Eligibility Test (NET). Our faculty has a few research publications and they had participated in National and International conferences and symposia also.

Our college NSS and NCC units and other departments conducted many extension activities like International Literacy Day, National Voters Day, International Democracy Day, International Yoga Day, Ekta Diwas, Swachh Bharath Abhiyaan, and Several other sensitization programmes.

Apart from that our college NSS units are conducting winter special camps at nearby habitations for a period of one week every year. Many cadets, volunteers are selected for Republic Day parades, National Integration Camps, and Adventurous Camps.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Our college has sufficient infrastructure and is provided with abundant facilities as per the requisites of the affiliating University.

The college has a vast campus and is spread over in 20 acres; beautified landscape with greenery and different plants, constructed in 70665.548sq.ft. of the area. The college has spacious, well ventilated, excellent aeration classrooms. Apart from the classrooms, well equipped laboratories are present. Every department has a departmental library.

Administrative building of the college is constructed in 5745.84sq.ft area, consists of the Management room, Office, IQAC, Principal chamber, Computer laboratory, Academic and Examination Cell etc.

Computer Laboratory is furnished with LCD projector for momentary and digital presentations.

There are 9 buildings in the campus. Arts and Commerce building is referred as UG block, which is built in

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15171.6sq.ft. It has a ground floor with 5 classrooms and 2 rest rooms; the first floor has 6 class rooms and 2 rest rooms.

PG block is constructed in 13522.1sq.ft; consists of 2 classrooms in cellar, 1 rest room. Ground floor has 4 classrooms, 1 girls waiting hall with attached toilet. The first floor has 5 classrooms, a computer lab, 1 staff room etc.

Old building occupies 7492.18sq.ft; consists of generator room, girls waiting room, boys waiting hall, NCC, Cultural room, Gym, Staff room, Open University study centre, Cafeteria, Store room, Rest room, Open dias etc.

Science block has well-equipped laboratories built in 27926.504 sq. ft. Ground floor has library, a reading room and an information and resource centre. Our college has installed 20KV solar panels as an initiative to promote renewable energy. Our college has a Seminar Hall, 3 Chemistry laboratories, a staff room, Botany lab, 2 labs for Zoology, 2 labs for Applied Nutrition and Public Health, 3 Physics labs, and 1 central instrumentation lab.

Our college has an RO water system for providing pure drinking water. Our college is provided with fire extinguishers in all the buildings. We have sports room for playing indoor games and a vast playground for outdoor games. Apart from that a parking shed for students and staff is present in the campus.

Student Support and Progression

Our college implements the capabilities enhancement schemes for the students. At the beginning of the academic year, a bridge course is given to first year degree students. All departments had taken responsibility in implementing the bridge courses.

The art of practicing Yoga helps in controlling one's mind, body and soul. It brings together physical and mental disciplines which is a requisite activity to the students. The dept. of Physical Education has taken the responsibility to organize Yoga and 25 students and the staff were participated.

For slow learners, remedial coaching classes are being conducted by all the departments of the college.

For the benefit of the students, to entry into competitive examinations as a part of career guidance, TASK programmes were initiated. Our college has various committees to address the grievances of the students regarding sexual harassment and anti-ragging. But no such complaints were received from the students.

Our college has invited 7 organisations for campus placements within the campus during the academic year 2019-20. 70 students were selected for various companies.

The college with immense pleasure says that during the academic year, 50 students rolled into higher education into various programmes in different universities.

Students' participation in various activities is monitored by students' council, which comprises of all class representatives. They are assigned various responsibilities to enlighten the students regarding the benefits of NSS, NCC, and Sports, maintain discipline among the freshers.

The college has alumni, initially the membership of alumni is 70 members and now the number is rose to 700.

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It is a privilege to say that of the total staff, 37% are from the alumni. They contribute books for the poor students of the college, and also being stake holders gives guidance to the students and they are the pamphlets of the college for the wellbeing and all-round development of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Our college is practicing a system through a delegation authority from honourary secretary of the college to the principal, and from the principal to HODs and Committees. Conveners of different committees conduct the meetings under the leadership of the principal.

Several faculty members are involved in moderation committee constituted by our affiliating University.

The IQAC, the Academic and Examination Cell looks into overall academic growth and quality improvements.

All the faculty are encouraged to attend seminars, FDPs and refresher courses to update their knowledge.

College library procures all the necessary textbooks, journals, magazines, and competitive books etc.

Internal evaluation is conducted twice every year and their performance is communicated to the students and the same is uploaded online to the University.

Our college established a Central Instrumentation Lab to promote the research culture among the students and teachers. Provide financial assistance to teachers to attend the conferences.

All the doctorates, M.Phil candidates are encouraged and paying the honorariums.

Every department has its own library. Science departments are sanctioned sufficient amount for the purchase of instruments and chemicals. Teaching faculty is appointed by duly constituted body. Selected employees are provided with benefits of EPF, ESI, CLs, Medical Leaves, Maternity leaves etc.

Students are given admissions on the basis of merit and reservation policies. College has an official website.

Account section manually maintains the account books, which are audited by the Chartered Accountant appointed by the Management.

The students enroll themselves for scholarships through www.telangana.epass.cgg.gov.in and their details are maintained in the college.

Examination pattern and timetables are according to the affiliating University. Online examination application forms (EAF) are filled in and uploaded to the Universities. Students can access their results online from official website of the University or from the college website and Notice Board.

Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Open University study center was opened in the college to offer the equal opportunities and to improve their level of education.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

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The college has power generating system, solar panels have the capacity producing 20KW, substantially the consumption of electricity is reduced and thereby meager power bill is observed.

Our college encourages physically disabled students, providing ramp facility for easy accessibility into the classrooms and restrooms. Our college helps divyangjan in examinations by arranging scribes. Institution takes initiatives to maintain the college eco-friendly, Swachh Bharath Abiyan Programme which is initiated by the Govt. of India. College has NSS, NCC and conducts regular clean and green, Haritha Haram Programmes every academic year. Steps are being taken for the disposal of garbage and pave a way for avoiding the plastic usage. Dustbins are placed at different vantage points.

As a part of Best Practice, our college raised the funds for National Foundation for Communal Harmony; NCC cadets are conducted a rally and collected fund as a part of Flag Day of Communal Harmony Campaign Week.

A meditation programme was conducted by Heartfulness Organisation. It is the best practice for the teachers and students to concentrate upon their responsibilities and achieving goals. A preceptor from Heartfulness Organization trained around 40 staff members for 3 days.

Our staff always motivates the students to get the benefits of NCC and NSS units. Students are also encouraged to participate in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Bridge courses are to be conducted to fill the educational gaps is our future plan of action. Online feedback from all stakeholders will be analyzed thoroughly to achieve excellence in the system.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The Institution has an effective mechanism for well-planned curriculum. It implements the process of completion of curriculum within the stipulated time to attain the programme outcomes effectively. The institution has three-fold mechanism for curriculum completion. This college is consistently working for the overall development of the students. Enough care is taken for systematic implementation of the prescribed syllubas. At the time of reopening of the college, Principal organises an academic meeting to discuss about teaching learning process, maintainance of academic diaries and academic calendar.

The list of holidays as per University and State circulars is put on the notice boards for the planning of the academic sessions.
- **ii) Department Level**: All the departments take departmental meetings on the regular basis with Principal to supervise the teaching-learning process. Different innovative teaching methodologies are to be organised and implemented to complete the curriculum effectively are discussed in the departmental meetings. The departmental timetable is prepared and the care is taken to see to it that it is getting executed properly. The workload is distributed to the staff-members. The care is taken to complete the curriculum in a stipulated time. The head of the department takes review of the departmental activities from time to time. The departments analyse the results at the end of the examinations to gauge the learning outcomes of the students. The remedial coaching helps the needy students to do better in their examinations. The emphasis is given on the conceptual clarity of students in remedial coaching.
- **iii) Individual level**: The implementation of curriculum is smoothly administered by teachers. Every teacher follows individual timetable. Class-wise, course-wise and number of lecture wise teaching plan is prepared by the individual teacher. Teachers complete the curriculum within the stipulated time. Every teacher enjoys the freedom to follow any innovative idea of teaching they wish. If needed, teachers also take extra lectures to complete the syllabus.
- **iv**) **Monitoring:** The implementation of teaching-learning is supervised regularly by the Head of the Departments and governed by the Principle. The IQAC monitors the overall teaching and learning process and the quality parameters by collecting feedback from all stakeholders.

- Academic calendar consists of dates of various academic activities to be undertaken by the college such as dates of admission, meetings, curriculum teachings, internal examinations semester examinations, preparation of teaching plan, allocation and distribution of workload among the departments, preparation of academic records and evaluation reports.
- Academic calendar is displayed on the notice board for the reference of students and staff and it is also uploaded in the college website.
- As per the academic plan, the curriculum and extra-curricular activities are planned and accordingly completed within the time, which enables the college to concentrate more on slow learners which would ultimately pave the way for improving the learning habits among the students as well as improving the results of the college.
- All types of academic activities such as workshops extension lectures, field trips, seminars, celebrations of national festivals and other events, literary and cultural competitions are scheduled in the academic calendar.
- The principal and the IQAC coordinator both personally monitor the execution of academic calendar and any deviation from academic calendar is reported suitable remedial action will be taken to implement the academic calendar in a smooth way.

Our institution plays vital role in Continuous Internal Evaluation of the students. For each semester, two internal assessment tests are conducted before semester examinations. Each internal exam is conducted as per the schedule given by the affiliating University. Extension lectures are organized in the college. Well experienced professors or guests are invited to deliver lecture on various topics in the subjects concerned. The institution places subject related field trips in the annual plan, which provides both knowledge and amusement to the students.

Mentor system is being implemented in the institution. Mentor, with his amiable nature, tries to interact with the mentee, know the strength and weakness of the slow learners. He/she takes advice from the teachers concerned and clarifies the queries of the slow learners, which helps in the improvement of pass percentage of the students. Remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners. Curricular and co-curricular activities help the students improve in various subjects. Classroom activities like students' seminars, quizzes etc. help the students improve themselves in the subjects concerned.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

At the beginning of the classes all the faculty members will address their students regarding the college history and tries to inculcate the moral values among the students. Most of the students are from rural background and they are very poor in communication skills of English. Therefore, the Department of English particularly focuses on these students for improvement of skills there in English language. Remedial classes will be conducted to the weak and slow learners and also subject materials will be provided to them. During the courses of regular classes, the teacher will revise the previous day's topic in a brief manner and continue his lecture with present topic and dictates notes on the same topic.

The vision and mission of our college had envisaged with the vision of economically empowering quality education, the students of differenct sections of the society in and around the town. And the mission of our college is to stand for exemplery values and ideals in civic life.

All stakeholders of our college are well aware about the aspirations of the students who hailes from rural backgrounds. Apart from traditional lecture method, chalk and talk method, teachers are focusing on conceptual building of their subject. The teacher demonstrates to elaborate the different concepts in their local context as well as ICT tools are used to visualise them. IQAC encourage teachers to organise and attend the refresher courses related to innovative teaching methodologies.

Methods of teaching:

Experiential Learning - In the course curriculum of the affiliating university some field studies/ trips and Industril visits are incorporated. Each department encourages students to get an experience what they are exactly studying in the classrooms and books. Dept. of Political Science arranges study tours to the local government and court. Students are taken to frequent visits to the local fort for knowing the history and culture.

Participative Learning — Our college students participate actively in each and every departmental events. Dept. of Telugu conducts 'Telugu Language Day' on the occasion of birthday of famous telugu poet Sri Gidugu Venkata Ramamurthy. The students of these departments do visit to nearby banks, industries and villages to understand and experience bank transactions, micro-finance groups etc. Students are encouraged to ask questions and share their thoughts in the class and assessed time to time

Problem-Solving Method –While teaching in the class, students participate in the learning process and experience those things in his/her practical, field work, industrial visits. Faculties encourage students to lead their learning towards solving of their problem and satisfaction. English faculty striving hard for providing them an opportunity for self-assessment and self-evaluation by improving the skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing. The overall output of different teaching methods is very positively seen in the result and behavior of the student. The guiding principle behind all these things is to ensure that students can link theory with practice, apply their knowledge, and participate in active learning.

Our institution has taken some measures to nurture the critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators. Students are encouraged to participate in elocutions to uplift their cognitive skills.

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2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

Our college has well equipped computer laboratory with requisite software and LAN connections. Our institution has internet connection, audio-visual and multimedia teaching aids. A special e-classroom with well-equipped smart board, LCD projector, TV with Air conditioned system. College departments have seperate PCs to update the student internal evaluation system. College is equipped with internet access through high speed broadband. All the staff are familiar with the ICT tools to strengthen the learning abilities of the students. All the teachers are conducting online classes during this pandemic situation as directed by CCETS, Hyderabad. PPTs are placed in Google classroom for anytime acess to the students. Students are encouraged to watch the learning resources like Youtube, e-PG pathashala and NPTEL MOOC lectures.

To keep our students and teachers pace with the changing scenario, library is updated with digital library, INFLIBNET membership. Our library is consisting of good number of educational CDs and DVDs. Social media is used generously by the college through Whatsapp groups, facebook accounts. Our college website is updated regularly with news and announcements related to academic and examination cell.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

Response:

Evaluation of the student is an integral part of teaching learning process. After conducting regular interactions with IQAC and Head of Departments, Examination Cell plans and workout the evaluation system. The college prepares the academic calendar by considering internal assessment, practicals, quizzes, seminars, etc.according to the almanac given by affiliating University. The institutional internal assessment

is done and will be uploaded to the University website. Tentative schedule of internal assessment is prepared and displayed on the notice board, uploaded in the website and shared in the whatsapp groups. The college takes extra efforts for slow and advanced learners.

The academic and examination cell monitors and conducts internal/external examinations in the college. The concerned faculty members submits the question papers to the academic and examination cell. CBCS is being implemented in which discipline specific courses, skill enhanced courses are included.

The assessment work is carried out by the concerned subject faculty in the institution. The evaluation reports are prepared within the stipulated time and communicated to the students in the classroom as well as displayed on the notice board. The answer books are shown to the students and guided them for their better performance in the forthcoming examinations. Old question papers, model question papers, and question banks are supplied to the students.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, timebound and efficient

IQAC is working on the student centric activities. It interacts consistently with the academic and examination cell and also with the students. In orientation programme, Principal briefs about the college, the curriculum, and the examination evaluation system. IQAC gives insights on COs, POS and PSOs. The college conducts tutorial, home assignments, tests, presentations, quizzes etc. to assess the performance of the students. New terms for grading system in CBCS pattern is elaborated to the students in achieving good CGPA. All examination-evaluation related grievances are addressed to the academic and examination cell where the Principal will be the chairman.

External supervisors, flying squads are deputed by the affiliating University for smooth conduct of exmainations. We follow the zero tolerance policy for the malpractice cases identified by the college and University. A suggestion/complaint box is available to the students to resolve all types of grievances. There is a provision for revaluation and recounting of marks in University examinations. Academic and examiantion coordinator acts as liaison officer between the University and the college for the redressal of grievances.

The college is having adequate infrastructure and physical facilities as per the requirement of the University and the need of the students. The college has sprawling campus spread over 20 acres of land with beautiful flora and composed of 70665.548 sqft. of built up area. There are total 13 departments with spacious classrooms and laboratories. All the departments have departmental libraries.

Administrative building of the college built up in 5745.84 sqft with management, Office, IQAC, Principal rooms and Computer Laboratory. Management room, Academic and Examination Cell, computer laboratory are equipped with LCD projectors for better presentations.

There are 9 (nine) Buildings in our campus.

Arts and Commerce Building – 15,171.6 Sqft. composed of Groundfloor with 5 classroom and 2 toilets, first floor with 6 classrooms and 2 toilets.

Post Graduate Building - 13,522.1 sqft. composed of cellar with 2 classrooms and 1 toilet, groundfloor with 4 classrooms, 1 girls waiting room and 1 toilet, and first-floor with 5 classrooms, computer lab, 1 staff room and 1 toilet.

Old Building is with 7492.18sqft composed of Generator Room, Girls waiting hall, Boys waiting hall, NCC, Cultural room, Gym (2 rooms), Staff room, Open University Room, Canteen, Store room, Security, and Open air stage.

Science building with laboratories of Life sciences and Physical sciences with 27926.504 sqft. Ground floor is consisting of UG library, PG library, reading room, digital library (Information and Resource Centre), 4 rooms (used for dumping broken furniture, computer general breakage etc.).

First floor of science building is having 1 big entrance, seminar hall, 3 Chemistry lab, 1 staff room, 1 Botany lab, 2 Zoology labs, 2 Applied NUtrition and Public Haalth labs, 3 Physics labs, 1 Central Instrumentation Lab.

All the labs are fully equipped, seminar hall is equipped with LCD projector with good speakers and have sufficient seating arrangements. RO water system is installed for safe drinking water. All buildings are equipped with fire safety system. The college has excellent facilities for indore and outdoor games and sports.

Two Computer Labs are equipped with split ACs, consists of 78 desktops with 500 GB harddisk.

Sports:-

Sports are special feature of the college and Physical Director has much experience. Our college sports and games department has a good track record of participation and winning at zonal, interzonal, University, Inter University , state and Inter State level. Many of our students are represented in affiliating university teams at different levels. We have plenty of play equipments required for all indore and outdoor games.

Our college also has all track and field events: 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m, 1500m, 3k, 5k run. Long jump, High Jump and Triple Jump fields are also prepared. Shotput, Discus throw and Javelin throw are the facilities available.

Outdoor games:-

Facilities for kabaddi, kho-kho, basketball with fencing and flood lights, volley ball with fencing and flood lights, badminton, tennikoit, handball etc. are available.

Indoor games:-

Facilities for sports like table tennis, carrom with lighting arrangements, chess are also available in college

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campus.

Gymnasium:-

The college has made provision for a Gym. It has following equipment: 14 station gym junction, 8 station gym junction, Bench Press-1, inclined & declined benches, mugdar, 15 sets of dumbells, 15 bars, twister, dumbell stand, bar stand, Weight plates of 5kg, 7.5kg, 10kg each 2 sets, 15kg and 20kg each 1 set.

4.4.2 There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Response:

The college is having care taker to look after the day-to day activities and maintenance of college campus. The maintenance staff consists of two gardeners, six sweepers, three watchman, three office attenders, Lab attenders in all science laboratories and one computer instructor.

In a systematic manner the college maintains infrastructure for necessary repairs whenever needed. Maintenance of the laboratory equipment and electronic devices, electric facilities, carpentry and sanitary, etc., are carried out with the persons on out sourced basis.

The college has enough space to accommodate all the requirements. There are enough classrooms for routine classes with spacious library, administrative office and other basic facilities as per the university affiliation norms. Internal cleaning of the college building is equally distributed among all the support staff. Garbage is regularly collected. Both urinals and toilets are regularly cleaned with proper hygiene. College has set up separate units for collecting solid and liquid waste. 20 KV solar lamps are installed on the campus. Furniture if any, damaged is replaced by new ones. Black boards and glass boards are replaced immediately. Broken glass panels of windows are replaced. The college has canteen which provides tea, snacks in quality at affordable rates.

Library has an advisory committee appointed by the Principal to monitor the smooth and effective functioning of all the services provided. It also shoulders various responsibilities of purchasing of the reference books, text books and some competitive examination books, journals and periodicals, etc. Library is substantially computerized, bar code system is adopted. It also uses the system of catalogue (OPAC). Regular cleaning of the books and racks is done to preserve them. The Library provides open access for all users. Library makes available different newspapers in Telugu and English. Stock verification is done Librarian seeks recommendations from the Departments to purchase necessary books. After arrival of the new books their titles are shared for information of staff and students. The library is providing free Wi-Fi facility to students and staff. Online access to e-journals is provided through INFLIBNET N-LIST Consortia. Retired Professor of Osmania University Prof. P. Nagaraja Rao, Department of Zoology, donated several Journals, books to our college library, and all were place in separate racks for aspirants of research.

All the computers for student's purpose and administrative purposes are maintained properly. The college has AMC with yearly basis. Maintenance of computer is done regularly as per requirement and major work is done during the vacation. Computer faculty looks after the maintenance job, such as updating of operating system, antivirus, software, hardware and technical problems, etc. In case of physical damage we call expert from related agencies. Power back up is provided to the computer systems to use them optimally. Broadband Leased Line FTTH Internet is provided and Wi-Fi units are also set up in the

college. LAN and internet connectivity is regularly tested. LCD projectors, software are also upgraded by time to time.

We have spacious Gymnasium Hall and a large play-ground which are well maintained and used optimally. Gymnasium Hall is utilized for playing indoor games such as table tennis, carrom and chess etc. We have plenty of availability of space on the play-ground. for all runnings, Kho-Kho, High jump, Long Jump and Shot put Etc., The college has organized sports competitions, NCC and NSS camps were organized. Students of the college have participated at University, State and National level.

There is a spacious cell for Cultural and other activities. It is well equipped with the audio-visual system and maintained regularly. There are various instruments for practicing cultural activities. Several committees of the college takes proper decisions and implements them for the betterment of the college and for the welfare of students.
